The Route 222 corridor from Reading has long been known as a drug route and now it is also a sex trafficking route.

The real horror and evil is happening at our southern boarder where a reported 85,000 children have crossed and just disappeared into the United States. If that is the number the government will admit to, you know it's much worse. The Mexican cartels now make more money trafficking in children for sex than they do trafficking in drugs or guns.
